Importance of Accountability in Nursing

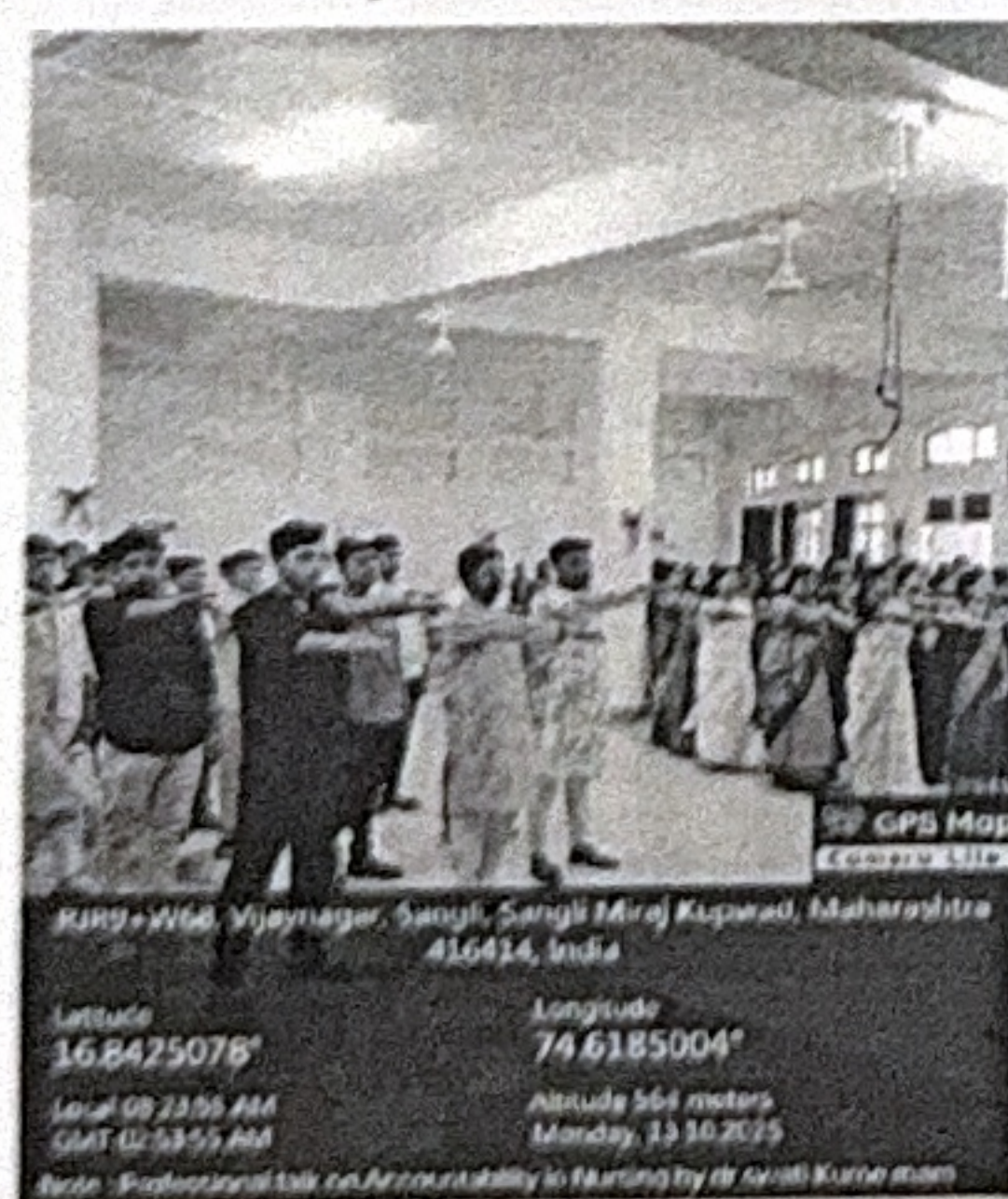
- Enhances Patient Safety: Ensures that nurses provide accurate, timely, and safe care.
