Globally, one of the major thrust areas is in emerging nanotechnology sector; especially on composite materials. The college has established a Centre of Composite Materials and undertakes research in association with North Carolina A & T State University, USA. The centre for composite material is now equipped with the facilities to synthesis and characterization of nanoparticles and composites. The research facilities include Atomic Force Microscope, Spin Coater, Electro spinning setup, Particle Size Analyser, FTIR, SEM Coater, Viscometer, Vortex Shaker, Microwave etc.

 Development of research labs in the department of chemical engineering: The university and institution has taken efforts to create necessary research facilities for the promotion and smooth conduct of research in frontier topics of Chemical Engineering. Since the development of effective and economic waste water treatment is very essential to all chemical engineering industries, the research has been initiated in the field of ultrasound cavitation for the degradation of organic pollutants. The ultrasound processor needed for carrying out this research is purchased through seed money. In addition to this, three labs have been developed in the department of chemical engineering with joint efforts of the University and DST (SERB and INSPIRE). These laboratories are multiphase reaction engineering laboratory, bioprocess engineering laboratory and membrane separation laboratory.

Faculty members of the college have published 799 research papers during the review period. Some of the research undertaken in a specialized area resulted into patent filing and its granting. Some of the important knowledge generating research is briefly mentioned below:

1. Power quality issues and fault ride through capabilities of double fed induction generator for wind turbine applications

Wind turbine generators are sensitive to the grid faults and in case of doubly fed induction generator, rotor current increases rapidly during such events therefore it needs to be disconnected during grid faults. A successful feed forward current regulator is developed and implemented which gives satisfactory results and able to limit the rotor current for voltage sags up to 0.3 pu.

2. Investigations, analysis and modelling on the applications of solid lubricants in grinding

Grinding is a well-known and popularly used machining process. The high specific energy required for the grinding process results into heat generation. The severe heat input causes thermal damage such as burns, surface and subsurface cracks, metallurgical phase transformations, residual tensile stresses and dimensional distortions. The heat generated may be carried away by the coolant.

Conventional coolants are not ecofriendly. With the use of solid lubricants in grinding has resulted into:

- ° Reduction in cutting forces and hence heat generated.
- ° Improved surface finish.
- Very small amount of coolants used, and possibility of recycling results in ecofriendly and economical process.

3. Behaviour of concrete encased steel composite members of framed structure

High rise structures in earthquake prone areas need basically ductility requirements of frame members. Heavy congestion of reinforcement especially at the beam column junction also creates difficulty in making such joints ductile. In order to overcome these difficulties and to make such structures as earthquake resistant structures, a possible way may be to make

a member of a structure of composite nature i.e. rolled steel sections encased in concrete. The research work aimed at studying the feasibility of "concrete encased steel composite members" with an objective to study the stiffness properties of the composite members with reference to various parameters such as variety in the rolled steel sections, changed grade of concrete. For this study, experimentation was carried out by testing cubes, beams and column specimens using normal reinforcement, angle reinforcement and pipe reinforcement.

The results of the experimental work are very encouraging from all aspects for beams and columns. It is observed that flexural strength of composite members is increased as compared to the normal steel reinforced sections whereas flexural deflection is reduced. The observed crack pattern indicates the increase in shear strength of flexural members. The columns made of composite sections exhibit increase in strength both axially and laterally. Increased modulus of elasticity for composite sections indicates the increase in stiffness of the sections. Effect of increase in grade of concrete has a direct proportional effect on the strength of the composite sections.

Thus, conventional reinforcement may be replaced by rolled steel sections to reduce the congestion of reinforcement at beam- column junction and hence may prove to be beneficial for multi-storied buildings and earthquake resistant structures.

4. Aeration methods for spillway

The hydraulic structures are affected by releasing water from the dam for various purposes. The spillway surface of high dam is susceptible to cavitation damage due to high velocity flow, geometrical deformities and surface roughness. Aeration on the spillway surface is one of the most reliable and economic measures used on dams worldwide for mitigating cavitation damage. Natural aeration on spillway may not reach the spillway surface and aerator is provided to induce the air along the spillway surface.

Ogee shaped spillway model made from perspex sheets is used in a tilting flume. Comparison of this method with cavitation index and different equations obtained from dimensional analysis for obtaining dimensionless parameters with the help of observed readings is carried out. In all, five dimensionless parameters are identified which give the functional relation between cavitation index, discharge, pressure and velocity of flow. The transition points from positive to negative pressure can be identified by varying the discharge. The results of these experiments are tabulated according to the flow conditions, i.e. free flow and gated flow for various discharges. Some equations are established between cavitation index and measurable parameters and threshold conditions after which cavitation is

most likely to appear are identified. These equations and the conditions will be of use in design of spillway.

In this study we conclude that shifting the piers down streams increases the discharges capacity considerably. However the problem of shear layer separation can occur but for these aerators of design standardized in some other studies can be easily used. Accumulation of silt in the reservoir is also studied by providing one & two silt layers on the bed of the reservoir.

The college has initiated an innovative event called Pune Biennale that aims to enhance art and aesthetics in public spaces of Pune city. Pune biennale has evolved as a joint venture between the University and Pune Municipal Corporation. It provided a platform for showcasing a variety of talent that include art, architecture, photography, urban planning and design, cinema, digital practices, information and technology based art practices, public art, street art and performance art.

Pune Biennale has also become a cauldron for brewing up contemporary ideas through its seminars and discussions. This is the only 2nd biennale in India. The first Biennale was also organized by the college based on communities' involvement.

The 2nd Biennale was celebrated in February 2015 and more than 300 artists participated in 10 exhibitions, 5 workshops and 6 art appreciation talks. It promoted street art, graffiti art and public performance in a big way; local people have already started considering their city as a venue for a major art event. Also Pune Biennale became instrumental in getting the local communities into the discourse of urban planning and development through architectural design display and discourses on urban planning and architecture. Local artists had created a number of site specific installations and junk sculptures which gave a different artistic experience to the public in Pune. Pune Biennale has consolidated its place on the national map and has also consolidated its position as a regional biennale.

The college has also undertaken two major projects, namely (i) Design and Development of 'Pune Art Plaza'at bund garden bridge – engagement with PMC, and (ii) Solid waste management project at ward level with local counselor. These projects have been successfully completed.

50. Briefly highlight the contributions of the department in generating new knowledge, basic or applied.

During the last five years under review, the institute has made significant contribution in generating new knowledge both in basic and applied field of Biotechnology. Prominent amongst these are in the broader areas of Microbial & Industrial Biotechnology, Health-related areas, Plant Biotechnology, and Nutraceuticals. The Institute's faculty developed successful protocol for the microbial production of the 1,2,4-butanetriol, one of the industrially important molecule. A strain of Bacillus has been characterized from the unique ecosystem; 'vada batter' for synthesis of anti-candida molecules against candidiasis, a serious infectious disease.

The basic research work at this organization on "investigation of glycation induced changes along with receptors for advanced glycation end products (AGE) in diabetes" has emerged a few interesting findings on receptors for AGE (Levels of RAGE inflammatory markers higher in Diabetes and with complications patients) further studies in this regard are in progress. A preliminary basic study on various forms of nutraceuticals has shown encouraging results (e.g. *C. brumani, P. nigrum*, Mo, Vit B₃) against diabetic nephropathy.

Considering importance of Polyunsaturated fatty acid (PUFA) in cell membrane and pharmacological benefits, the investigation was carried out on process optimization and cycle time reduction for PUFA synthesis using marine microorganisms since the major challenge in PUFA synthesis is its slower rate of production. This study generated important piece of information, such as process optimization for microbial production of PUFA which can exploited for the commercial synthesis of PUFA.

The institute's faculty standardized commercial micro propagation protocol for medicinally important plants. Further, able to develop production protocol for Amarkand – as traditionally used tuber as functional food.

During the last five years under review, the faculty members filed five patents in all the above said areas of Biotechnology. The external funding agencies such as DST, DBT, MoFE, DRDO, ICAR and ICMR provided financial support. The University also provided substantial financial support to carry out above said basic and applied research.

Patents obtained and filed (process and product)

During last five years, the faculty members and students filed 07 patents with Indian Patent Office out of which 03 are process patents and 04 are product patents.

Original research contributing to product improvement

Research work carried out by one of the faculty members has contributed to improve pharmaceutical product 'Cytonini and Cytomaw' and is patented by no. 1632/MUM/2013, 1633/MUM/2013, 1634/MUM/2013 and 1635/MUM/2013.

Findings of studies conducted to minimize the allergic reactions 'rhinitis' and 'anaphylaxis' that arise due to pollutants; on isolation of potential pathogens from state transport vehicles thereby decreasing possibility of contagious diseases; and on isolation of potential pathogens from food products of subway foods have benefited the community.

Additionally, a study conducted on isolation of food borne pathogens from midday meal samples of 11 schools, showed high levels of pathogenic microorganisms. The results were communicated to the concerned authorities and presented at a conference.

Research outcomes that have led to new initiatives and social development

Following research outcomes have contributed to new initiatives and social development:

- A pilot survey conducted on biowaste management facilities at 29 higher educational institutes highlighted the significance of using the facilities of the Municipal Corporation. The findings have been published in an international journal and also presented at a conference to communicate the outcomes.
- A pilot study on safety measures of contraceptives found presence of pathogens in few new branded contraceptives. Accordingly, contraceptive

manufacturers have taken precautionary measures for improvement in quality of the contraceptives. The findings of the study were also published in Times of India.

A need assessment exercise was undertaken before the development of shortterm and skill development courses in Hospitality, such as

- Six month Certificate course in Customer Service.
- Six month Certificate course in Hotel Housekeeping,
- Six month Certificate course in Restaurant Operations,
- One year Diploma in Culinary Arts,
- One year Diploma in Hotel Operations.
- Skill development courses in Hospitality and Tourism will be introduced from 2016-17.

Realization of need: It was realized that there is a need for vocational courses at the entry level, based on feedback received from the Hotel and Catering Industry. The industry requires skilled workers at the operation level and not managers. Hence, the need was felt to design these courses.

Designing course content: The content of the curriculum of these courses was designed considering the competencies to be developed amongst the entry level students.

Fixation of duration of courses: The duration of courses was finalized based on the content of the skills to be developed and knowledge to be imparted during that period.

The feedback of the faculty is obtained periodically on the curriculum as well as on the teaching-learning-evaluation process. The relevant feedback is incorporated in the curriculum during the curriculum modification / revision process. Presently, inputs from the faculty have been used to frame the choice based credit system. The curriculum is based on the AICTE prescribed syllabus and has a learner-centric approach based on participatory and interactive teaching and learning. The evaluation of students is based on continuous internal assessment and semester-end examination.

b) students on staff, curriculum and teaching-learning-evaluation and how does the department utilize the feedback?

The feedback is obtained from students on the staff, curriculum and teaching-learning-evaluation process periodically at the end of each academic session. 46. How does the department ensure that programme objectives are constantly met and learning outcomes are monitored?

Program Objectives and framework of the curriculum –

The curriculum of the four years bachelor's degree in Hotel Management and Catering Technology (BHMCT) and three years bachelor's degree in Science (Hospitality and Hotel Administration) was devised with a view to keep abreast with the current changing trends in the hospitality industry.

The basic objective of the programs is to provide to the hospitality industry a steady stream of competent young men and women with the necessary knowledge, skills, values and attitudes to occupy key operational positions. The course structure of the program is designed keeping in view the basic objective stated above. Objectives of these programs include the following:

- To impart to the students latest and relevant theoretical and practical knowledge from the field of hotel management.
- To provide opportunities to the students, within and outside the institutions, for developing necessary operating skills relating to the hospitality industry.
- To develop the right kind of values and attitudes to function effectively in the hospitality trade.

The following considerations have been taken into account while implementing the curriculum:

- The knowledge inputs and opportunities for skill development have been offered in an evenly distributed and logically sequenced manner. The design is simple and logical.
- The relative importance of skills development and attitudinal orientation in catering management education where an institution offering the program has some freedom on course development in choosing methods of instruction, and internal assessment within a broad framework of objectives and curriculum structure.
- Internal, continuous assessment, consisting of tasks like classroom exercises, tests, seminars, presentations, quizzes, group tasks, term papers etc. are means of testing the objectives and monitoring the learning outcomes. The curriculum has a learner centered approach based on participatory and interactive teaching and learning.

47. Highlight the participation of students and faculty in extension activities.

Yearwise activities of the NSS unit of Institute of Hotel Management and Catering Technology are as follows.

50. Briefly highlight the contributions of the department in generating new knowledge, basic or applied.

The faculty of the institute are encouraged to pursue their Ph.D in the field of Hospitality and Tourism in the areas of Human Resource Management, Environmental Management, Health Tourism, etc. which helps in creating significant and impactful knowledge contributions of the faculty for disseminating new knowledge to the students.

One of the research studies has highlighted the vital competencies required and their development in a good Hospitality Institute.

Research in operational areas of luxury hotels, such as the assessment of human resource management practices with respect to housekeeping employees in hotels has revealed the extent to which the various dimensions of HRM are defined across the different segments of luxury hotels.

A research study carried out on challenges faced by women in the hospitality industry in their career progression revealed that women in hospitality industry in Pune are still under represented in senior positions and are around 13% of the total employees in a hotel.

Observation of environmental practices in five-star hotels helped to identify areas for environmental improvement and suggestions for improving the environmental performance in the hospitality industry.

A research study on health and wellness tourism helped to create awareness about the health-care support portal for gaining access to health-care services in India, through VISA legislations. The study also explored the liaison of hotels with hospitals to provide first-class health-care services at third-world prices.

Strengths:

- Qualified, experienced and dedicated teaching faculty.
- Prevalence of disciplined and conducive learning environment.
- A dedicated training and placement cell in the institute.
- An in-house hospitality training centre for practical training of the students.
- Well equipped laboratories and an enriched library.

Weaknesses:

- Limited research, consultancy and collaborations.
- Insufficient funds for upgradation

Opportunities:

- Scope for more collaborations and linkages for internship training with the industry and to create employment opportunities for the students abroad.
- To conduct more faculty development programs.
- Use of advanced technology in teaching and learning activities.
- Initiating collaborative research projects with industry and other funding agencies.

Challenges:

- Difficulty in creating a positive perception among parents towards the course and the opportunities it provides.
- Attracting students due to mushrooming of various institutes offering hotel management courses.
- Low remuneration offered to passed out students makes it difficult to attract students of high academic caliber.

MBA-FM programme was introduced. The following method was adopted for its implementation:

- Employment demand: there is high need for post graduates with specialised skill and knowledge in financial markets. As India is a service economy the contribution and growth of the service sector has been increasing at a fast pace in the recent years. Of these the financial services sector has witnessed surge in demand and need of specialised skills from its employees and aspirants. There is an increasing number of financial services companies, hence the demand for candidates with specialised financial markets skills will be on the rise, The genesis of the MBA in Financial Markets program is to develop a talent pool for meeting the growing needs of the financial and commodity markets
- Competitive Analysis/ Benchmarking: there is no similar course offered by any other institution in Pune and in Maharashtra, however, short modules of courses under financial services are offered by other small trainers and institutions, but a bundled programm at the PG level is not offered by any.
- Possible Job opportunities for students: The type of organisations that will require the expertise of such graduates are; Banks, Financial Institutions, Investment Banks, Mutual Funds, Asset Management, Stock Exchanges, Brokerage and Intermediate houses, Financial Consultants, Corporates into portfolio investment, Financial Newspapers and media, Research agencies, Regulatory and Policy Makers.

The type of positions offered by these organisations include: Analyst, Associates, Portfolio Managers, Client Relations/Relationship Manager, Risk Manager, Experts in Commodity Trade, Fund Managers, Investment Consultants, Wealth Manager, Hedge funds manager, Research experts, Compliance experts and as entrepreneurs.

• E-waste Management

Disposal of e-waste generated by ever growing use of electronic instruments has created serious problem before environmentalists and the society. This research aims at finding efficient ways of managing the e-waste. This study has suggested the 3R strategy of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle to a greater extent.

• Fuzzy Logic

The main objective of this study is to help doctors to make accurate diagnosis by analyzing the complex relationships that different diseases have. The impreciseness in medical knowledge and variation in decision can be better handled by fuzzy logic. Fuzzy logic significantly increases accuracy as it allows smooth transition between data partitions. The study reveals that Fuzzy algorithm is time efficient than crisp algorithm although Fuzzy algorithm takes more memory than its crisp counterpart. Fuzzification Technique has great impact on accuracy of algorithm.

• Crime and Criminal Investigation

It is observed that majority of the police departments are using the application software for analysis of criminal data. The study reveals that, none of the police department in the selected areas is connected to the national database of crime. A model has been suggested by the researcher, wherein a mechanism is provided to use the offline District Crime Record Bureau (DCRB) or State Crime Record Bureau (SCRB) database. The suggested system is capable of forecasting the time and place of crime. The authorities can deploy its forces accordingly and thus reduce crime in the jurisdiction.

• Customer Relationship Management

A comparative study of four service sectors of Banking, Insurance, Telecomm and Hospitality viz-a-viz implementation of Customer Relationship Management (CRM) has been undertaken. Study reveals that the Telecomm sector has implemented CRM to at large extent whereas Hospitality sector shows least extent of implementation of CRM practices.


